**ROCKY POINT FIRE/EMS BOARD NEWS**

Three Board members, Fire Chief, and a guest attended the February meeting. Minutes and money matters preceded the Chief’s report.

In the previous month, volunteers responded to 3 medical aid calls, 4 motor vehicle accident, 1 mutual aid fire, and 1 mutual aid fire inspection. Equipment received the biannual servicing. Training for regular drill totaled 36 hours, plus 1 special drill for 40 hours, and 1 burn learning drill for 70 hours. That means our volunteers invested 140 hours in one month. Quilt used the Aspen Room 5 days.

Update on OSHA status confirmed there were 5 citations. No word yet on the grant proposal submitted to replace fuel storage. Loren will continue to get estimates on the project, which Quilt will help fund.

A visit from 911 Executive Director was postponed, due to weather.

Board reviewed and passed an agreement with Klamath County Road Department for them to park a county road maintenance vehicle on Fire Department property at no charge.

Loren reminded everyone that there are 3 Board positions up for election this year. Anybody interested in serving should contact him ASAP.

Loren requested replacing vehicle 2101, the pick up, with a diesel model. The Board asked that he set up a 5-year equipment plan before they make a decision in that matter. Volunteers may help with the cost of a replacement truck.
